How my Interact journey made a difference

Following is the winning essay written by Interactor Ryan Christopher Guai from Hwa Chong Institution Interact Club, which was read at the weekly meeting held on 23 May 2018...

Making a difference. What is it? To create positive change in the world, some could venture; to have an impact, to leave behind something important, tangible or intangible.

I joined Interact club exactly one-and-a-half years ago, slightly apprehensive, and unsure of what the future would hold. I had always enjoyed community service, but there was always a nagging feeling in the back of my mind that I was doing something wrong. It was only upon further introspection that I could pinpoint the error in my ways -- I was going through the motions; I was doing it because I had accepted that I had a certain responsibility to do my part for the community, but had never fully questioned and ruminated over the true impact I was having.

Today marks the final day of my Interact journey. As I sit down and reflect upon my experience, I am glad that I no longer have to say the same.

Over the past year and a half, I have had many incredible opportunities to learn, and to serve in a wide range of capacities. This is in no small part down to the initiatives of my club's Exco members, who have taken steps to tailor an Interact experience that is dynamic, varied and fun. In doing so, I have conversed and come to know people from all walks of life, ranging from the children from disadvantaged families that I tutored on a weekly basis, to the numerous elderly, disabled and even terminally ill whom I have had the chance to serve and get to know better over the course of my time in Interact.

The bulk of my time in Interact was spent at two activity centres catered to children living in the neighbourhood, namely, Beyond Social Services in Tiong Bahru and MCYC Community Services in Bukit Batok. Our role at the centre primarily involved providing the children with academic help — assisting them with homework, answering their queries and encouraging them at times where they were close to giving up.

The cynic in some of us may question if we were actually having any kind of substantial impact. Initially, I too, had such doubts. After all, there were times where the children refused to listen to us and instead of studying, ran off in the hope that we would chase after them. There were times where we made an insensitive remark, and were





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subsequently ignored by our tutee for the rest of the session. There were times when our tutees were listless and bored, unable to focus on anything we were saying.

It took time, but, as time passed, I slowly began to fathom how important these weekly sessions were to these kids, and how vital it was for us not to underestimate our role at the centres. For this realization, I credit three parties – one, the children, two, their parents, and three, the staff at the centres, whose words of encouragement and gratitude were what kept me going.

Our visits were important because it provided a safe space, a conducive environment to learn and play, which, for many of these children, was a rarity. Many of us take for granted the role of our parents in acting as mentor and a guiding figure for us to lean on throughout our childhood. However, these kids do not have such a fortunate upbringing. Many come from single-parent or impoverished families, and have parents who are (to no fault of their own) too preoccupied with work to play a more active role in their children's lives. Many hail from schools which do not belong to the elite tier of schools that many of us are used to, and as a result, find it difficult to concentrate in their school environment. For them, we volunteers represented role models, someone to look up to, a beacon of hope to show that they too could achieve something if they worked hard enough for their goals. Our study sessions represented a platform, where they could clarify their doubts without being judged, and receive that extra push that perhaps some of them needed to keep at it, particularly during the intensive exam periods. Our friendship gave them reassurance, that, every week without fail, they would have someone to share their struggles with and a comforting listening ear to fall back on.

Of course, all the above was merely from the children's perspective. For their parents, us Interactors, along with the other volunteers at the centre, represented people that they could entrust with their children's development, which allowed them to pursue their other endeavours, and perhaps made it easier to cope with the numerous things they had to juggle. For the centres, it was our volunteerism that made all of their activities possible, and allowed them to create the positive change in society that they were set up with the intention of creating.

While I have written at length about the impact my Interact journey has had on society, this process has had a similarly great impact on my own personal growth and development. I have grouped my learning points into three main areas – increased self-awareness, greater emotional intelligence and a renewed passion for community service and volunteerism.

Firstly, my Interact journey has made me more aware of my strengths and weaknesses, in particular, the latter. When I first became an Interact member, I had already had various experiences of community service from my secondary school days, where I had embarked on several Service Learning projects. However, being in Interact really pushed me to my limits as the complexity of issues I handled and number of difficulties I faced increased exponentially. It was only through such a process that I became more cognizant of a number of areas where I was sorely lacking in, which going forward, will serve as a springboard for me to continue to improve my service ability and work towards the goal of "Service before Self".

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Secondly, I have become more sensitive to others' feelings, and mature in handling difficult situations. This has come through repeated interaction and conversation with different beneficiaries, which has improved my ability to read the emotions of others and respond in an appropriate and reasoned manner.

Thirdly, my Interact journey has only increased my passion of serving others. Going into Interact, I always had a slight fear that I would lose my interest in community service simply because of the saturation of volunteer opportunities. However, on the contrary, my Interact journey has exposed me to the magnitude of often hidden problems that continue to plague our society, and made me ever more determined to do my part for those around me.

In summary, my Interact journey has made an immeasurable difference to my own life, and the lives of countless others. I am hugely thankful for all the experiences I have been given, and hope to be able to use my newfound knowledge and skills constructively going forward.

Since his passing, your love for Mom and warmth for our family are much appreciated by us. 
