# Global Grant Projects – The First 50

The Rotary Foundation (TRF) first announced the massive revamp of the Matching Grants Scheme in 2010. It was then known as the **Future Vision**, meant to fund projects making greater impact and better sustainability. Rotary Clubs all over the world scrambled to understand this new program that did away with all physical paperwork and require a project budget of at least USD\$30,000 – almost **6 times the amount** of the typical budget of a Matching Grant Project.

The Future Vision became what is known today, as the District and Global Grants and was officially launched on **1** July **2013**. Back then, broadband width and broadband speeds were not as developed as it is today and many countries were still using 2G and 3G communication networks. This led to many frustrations among Clubs in the world as they had to grapple with the developing technology and with the **100% online applications**, authorizations and reports by Project Sponsors and District Officials.

RC Singapore was fortunate enough to seize upon this opportunity and made the most of it. Applications were submitted in gusto and funds were obtained from District and The Rotary Foundation (TRF) for the new TRF Global Grants using the online system. Looking back, it was indeed a very brave endeavor by the Board of our Club for the year 2013/2014. A total of **17 Global Grants** were proposed, written and submitted to TRF for that year alone, of which **13 Global Grant Projects** were eventually approved.

These included 2 community **Projects in Singapore** that became the combined "Major Project" for Rotary Year (RY) 2013/2014. Club Heal "Funding to Train HEALing Friends" a project to train volunteers for as counsellors for those recovering from mental illness and "Architects of Life," a Life Skills and Leadership Project for 2<sup>nd</sup> time drug offenders that were currently incarcerated at Changi Prison in Singapore, were the 2 projects.

Since then, our Global Grants Projects has cut across all the 6 Areas of Focus and across several countries and continents. Our signature **Basic Education and Literacy (BEL)** projects in Indonesia has helped thousands of elementary schoolchildren to continue with their journey to complete basic primary education. Teachers' capacity building and training as well Parents Livelihood Program ensured that we complete the help necessary throughout the Education ecosystem.

In India, RC Singapore is proud to be involved in the setting up of **8 Rotary Eye Hospitals** across 3 states in West Bengal, Odisha and Bihar and sponsored at least **100,000 cataract eye surgeries** since the Global Grants system was implemented. We are also involved in the construction of **toilets and running water** in many schools and villagers there. A Basic Education project in India included the setting up of a Rotary School and Skills Center as well as

providing basic education to vulnerable populations far removed from modern facilities. Under Disease Prevention and Treatment (DPT), our most recently approved Global Grant is an USD\$80,000 Project for **vaccination for school girls** in India of against Human Papillomavirus (HPV) and cervical cancer.

The **other Global Grants approved** included Economic Livelihood for post-earthquake disaster rebuilding efforts in Nepal and Philippines, Water and Sanitation Projects in Vietnam and Indonesia, Artificial Limbs Provision in Lagos, Nigeria and Dementia Screening for the Elderly in Taiwan.

RC Singapore is now widely known within the region and to TRF for its **expertise** with Global Grants application, implementation and monitoring. While previously valued for its financial contributions to Projects, such is our Club's currency at this moment that we are now sought as a Partner to **provide guidance and advice** for many Global Grant applications in other Districts, with financial contributions being a secondary consideration.

Given that now the Global Grants system is now well established, RC Singapore would like to make a greater impact hopefully, for the **next 50 Global Grants** by concentrating on Projects and Clubs that plan to make a significant impact with the Community. This will include the **intimate involvement** of our Club Members with the Needs Assessment, Planning, Design, Implementation and Monitoring of such Global Grants, with **less emphasis** and involvement in 3<sup>rd</sup> Party Projects, where Rotary Clubs are simply financial "conduits" for these non-Rotary organizations.

We shall aim to make our projects **organically and systematically conceived**, with the "**RC Singapore-DNA**" embedded within. We shall also be guided to make our projects Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant and Timely, **(SMART)** in addition to making it **sustainable** so that when we complete and walk away from these Projects, the effects and benefits for the aided community will continue unabated.

Finally a **word of thanks** to ALL our Club members who have worked hard and spent time and energy for the success of our first 50 Global Grant Projects. Yes, we feel proud, and rightly so, **being the envy** of Clubs and Districts around the world when it comes to what we have achieved with our Global Grant Projects, however we **will always remain humbled** by the generosity and unstinting support received from our Club Members, our Families and the Friends of the Club, **without which** we will be found wanting.

Our Club's extraordinary financial muscle plus our strong sense of "humanitarian justice" to make a difference to the "social turpitude" that we witness in society all around our daily lives and our community means that we shall not rest on our laurels and continue to reach out farther with the grace of God Almighty.


